Our supplementary Black history curriculum responds to fashionable narratives of despair with true stories of struggle, triumph, hope, and resilience.


The Woodson Center's curriculum includes:

- Biddy Mason, who was born a slave but died a millionaire philanthropist.
- The 54th Massachusetts, whose courage in battle redefined the Civil War.
- · Marcus Garvey, controversial prophet of Black pride and Black Power.
- Covert, Michigan, the small frontier town that rejected racial segregation.
- Bessie Coleman, daredevil aviator whose tragically short life blazed new trails.

Rather than view American history through a lens that emphasizes racial grievance and discourages lower-income children of color, the Woodson Center's free high school and K-8 lessons center on compelling stories of Black excellence, inspiring students to take charge of their futures and find their place in the American story.

Since 2020, Woodson Center lessons have been downloaded over 50,000 times for use in public, private, and charter schools; home schools; community and church-based programs; adult education courses; and much more.

Each lesson package includes educator-designed presentation decks, discussion activities, assessments, learning standards, and other supporting documents. Our material can be used to supplement history, civics, English, and social/emotional learning curriculum topics.
